#### TREES4KIDS PROJECT

Five schools attended our Conservation Education workshops over this quarter with one more school, Nice View from Msambweni opting for an extra ordinary activity. These schools were privileged to take part in the inaugural project dubbed 'Tree4Kids Project '. This a new approach to assign tree care responsibility to a certain number of learners as so to ensure higher tree survival rates. The learners are supposed to update Colobus Conservation by taking photos and sharing them through their teachers or parents mobile phones, the health status of the trees will be validated during the regular school visits.

#### **Kaya Education**



We conducted two education workshops and one kaya session were held for Gandini Central Primary and Minyenzeni Secondary Schools. This project is supported by GEF-SGP grant and implemented by Colobus and its partners. A total of 100 (50 male and 50 female) learners, 4 teachers, 3 volunteers and 3 facilitators were involved.

# "Colobus mother re-united with her baby"

Knowing there was a mother out there stressed looking for her baby, the team went back immediately and searched for the troop for about an hour. As luck would have it, the infant's cries attracted the mother who began calling out while running through the trees and came down and picked up her baby and examined her baby while cuddling him in a tight embrace as he started suckling. All this while, the troop were on the trees calling out as if welcoming the baby back into the family!

## COVID-19 BREAKS DOWN OPERATIONS

Colobus Conservation is a not for profit organization that receives no funding from the Government and is highly dependent on volunteer income, income from Eco-tours and donations from the public which in total contributes up to 50% of our annual income. With Kenya confirming its first cases of Coronavirus the Government has banned entry of all international flights from areas affected with Coronavirus closing our borders and issuing of Visas. We have had to postpone volunteer bookings and close down Eco-Tours with immediate effect. This has greatly affected our ability to take care of our primates and our 24hr animal rescue response due to limited resources. We have no way of knowing when this period of travel limitations will stop and worst case scenario this goes on for months. Any donation will be highly appreciated.
